MUSIC

Have you ever gotten chills when listening to music? I certainly have. And I must admit, I'm not always sure why I get them. But there is definitely something about music that can really touch a person. I have gotten chills listening to all sorts of different music, different instruments, different styles, and in different situations. I suspect most of you have as well.

The impact of music is so well known that it is used extensively in media. You know exactly when something bad is about to happen in a horror movie by the change in the tone of the background music. The star-crossed lovers fall in love at first sight while happy and romantic music plays. The clumsy oaf takes a pratfall to a belittling ditty. Music is powerful.

We can even compare human lives to pieces of music. I find this an intriguing analogy. At different times in our lives the tone and tenor of our music changes; sometimes it's glorious and joyful and sometimes it's somber and sad. Sometimes our lives sing solo, and sometimes our lives intersect with many other pieces of music, with many other people's lives. This idea appeals to me, in part, because I love to think of God as composer, director, and audience. I imagine the beautiful music God creates for and hears from creation.

That's not to say it's always beautiful; after all, we are certainly capable of causing chaos and strife in our lives. But God is the great improviser and can weave even the most discordant notes into glorious music.

Even when it seemed all of creation was thrown into chaos and the music might even end, when Christ was on the cross, God wove the music into a resurrection magnum opus.

I'm certainly not the first person to entertain this analogy. One of my favorite authors, J.R.R. Tolkien, used this exact idea in the first section of his book "The Silmarillion." The beginning of that book is a creation narrative in which Eru ("The One") first creates a group of spirits or demiurges (Ainur) and gives them a theme from which they are to make great music. Melkor — whom Eru had given the "greatest power and knowledge" of all the Ainur — broke from the harmony of the music to develop his own song. Some Ainur joined him, while others continued to follow Eru, causing discord in the music. This happened three times, with Eru successfully incorporating his rebellious subordinates' discordant notes into the greater musical composition each time.

It's an intriguing thought, all of creation as the music composed by God. I also find this a somewhat reassuring thought: God as great composer, great director, and great improviser; easily capable of weaving powerful themes, melodies, music from even the most humble life. I wonder, what your life sounds like. I wonder how God is using you in the great masterpiece of creation.

MUSIC NOTES

TOP TEN REASONS FOR NOT JOINING THE CHOIR

... and Why That's no Excuse!

- 10. I can't read music. There are many strategies for learning. Many anthems can be found on YouTube with individual parts often highlighted. Make notations on the scores. Come early or meet outside with Karen or another choir member to practice parts. Sometimes the whole choir sings, for instance, the alto part giving those in that section confidence and providing a good practice in reading someone else's "line."
- 9. **I'm scared of auditions.** Easy answer you show up, you're in. All are welcome.
- 8. I can't come every week. It is important to have a sense of commitment, but then there's that pesky thing called "life." There are illnesses, care giving responsibilities, grandchildren visits, another musical commitment like the Williamsburg Symphony. The hope is that you can spare the 45- to 75-minute commitment most weeks.
- 7. I've never sung anywhere but the shower. This is just like singing in the shower, except for the water, being naked, and being alone.
- 6. **I don't have childcare.** We can figure that out.
- 5. I don't know what part I sing. We can figure that out too.
- 4. I have musical dyslexia. See #10 above.
- 3. I can't take direction. Have you seen or heard Karen in rehearsal?! She is a benevolent dictator.
- I sometimes have a tough week and don't won't to share those down feelings. Singing releases endorphins which reduce stress and anxiety levels and contribute to a positive mental state.
- The plate in my head receives messages from outer space when I sing in harmony. Not an issue – the choir chairs have been retrofitted with an intergalactic interceptor shield.

TOP TEN REASONS TO JOIN THE CHOIR

- 10. You can wear whatever you like to church because choir robes cover everything, at least at the 11:00 service. If you think the choir robe is going to be too hot join the Matins Choir and wear what you like, but remember you'll probably be on camera!
- 9. You get to be first to communion. We all want to be the first ones in line to the buffet, and when you're in the choir, you get to go first <u>if</u> the usher tells you it's okay.
- 8. The Choirs are an instant family full of wonderful people, unique people, funny people, caring people, loving people.
- 7. You may meet your new best friend(s).
- 6. You have a reserved seat for the service every time.
- 5. You contribute to the understanding of the lectionary readings for the day maybe even more so than the sermon does oops, sorry Pastor Jon.
- 4. Studies show that choral singing improves our mood, with a decrease in stress, depression and anxiety. Let Karen do the worrying about when to come in. You worry about whether you have the right piece of music in front of you.
- 3. You can praise the Lord with body, mind, spirit, and voice, while having fun.
- 2. Choir focuses on DOING rather than OBSERVING.
- 1. The three F's: Fun, Fellowship, and occasionally Food. Enough Said.

STEPHEN MINISTRY AT ST. STEPHEN



You Don't Even Have to Have Your Own Personal Crisis!

Many people assume that a person requesting the help of a Stephen Minister has a personal crisis going on. Yes, that is frequently the case: They may be having a health issue, be going through a separation or divorce, be going through a crisis and loss of faith, or may be experiencing a major depression. However, in many cases, it's not a crisis of their own making or of their own particular life that is the challenge. It may be due to stresses piled on by the world around them that they could use help with. Having a Stephen Minister to talk to, to verbalize with about the situation, to regain footing with and to get stabilized can be tremendously helpful in such situations.

What kind of situations am I talking about? Well, just a few examples...

- Your best friend from childhood who you still have coffee with once a week is going through a crisis and wants to put all of their problems at your feet. You want to be there for them, to provide the best help for them, and don't know where to start. You feel overwhelmed!
- Your son-in-law in another town has a cancer diagnosis. His treatment is going well but your daughter is distraught and worried. How can you be supportive of her in her crisis?
- You worry about adult children deployed in the military or moved to other areas of the country with employment...No specifics of danger but distance generates fears and anxiety!
- You have concern about memory lapses in your aging spouse and what that may portend for the future.
- You have anxiety about children and grandchildren in schools or on the street after hearing about availability of guns or drugs or other lurking dangers.

Many things lead to appropriate anxiety or sometimes free-floating anxieties. When these may be getting the better of you, talking with a Stephen Minister may help to bring things back into appropriate perspective.


