A LUTHERAN PRIMER, 3

Okay, it's the last month of the year. So I thought I'd wrap up the Lutheran primer I've been doing over the last couple of months. I hope you have enjoyed these summaries of Lutheran concepts, and I hope you have a very blessed Advent and Christmas season!

Christology: There have been countless books written on this particular topic! "Christology" describes our attempts to understand the nature of Jesus Christ. More specifically what do we mean when we say that Jesus is fully human and fully divine? Luther did not deviate much from the common theological understanding of his time, and we still today accept that the divine and human are "inseparably joined" in the person of Jesus Christ; though what exactly **that** means can often be an interesting topic of conversation and lead to some tough questions: Did the divine die on the cross? Is it even possible for the divine to die? Etc.

New Obedience: If we are justified solely by faith, then what of good works? Well, Luther understood that faith yields good works and that "a person must do such good works as God has commanded for God's sake but not place trust in them as if thereby to earn grace before God."

The Church: Luther believed, and we confess that there is one holy, Christian church. And that it is "the assembly of all believers among whom the gospel is preached...and the sacraments are administered in conformity with the divine Word." Luther also understood that it is not necessary that uniform ceremonies and traditions be observed everywhere.

Confession and Repentance: Luther was a fan of private confession and absolution, though he did not believe it necessary to list all one's sins or that it was a requirement for communion. And just FYI: I am quite capable of offering private confession and absolution if any would find it helpful in dealing with something that lies heavy on their heart. Regarding repentance, it is the act of a truly contrite heart and leads to the understanding that through Christ we have forgiveness and grace.

Church Governance: Luther understood that no one should preach, teach or administer the sacraments without a "proper [public] call." We also understand that church governance is aimed at providing good order within the church and has nothing to do with salvation or grace. Church governance and traditions can be helpful, but we are not to "burden [our] consciences with them as if such things were necessary for salvation." Things like fasting and vows of silence, celibacy, poverty, etc. can be helpful as spiritual disciplines, but they do nothing with regards to salvation.

Concerning the Power of Bishops: This one might get me in some trouble, so I will skirt the finer points of the Office of Bishop that caused debate back in 1999 with CCM and stick with the basics. Holding the "office of the keys" the power of the Bishop is to "preach the gospel, to forgive sin, to judge doctrine and reject doctrine that is contrary to the Gospel and to exclude from the Christian community the ungodly..." and that "parishioners and churches owe obedience to bishops." But whenever Bishops teach or institute something to the contrary of the gospel we have God's command not to be obedient any longer. Luther also expressly stated that the power of the Bishop ought not to be secular and that it is confined to the church.

And remember that these are simple summaries of often complex concepts; so please don't hesitate to ask any questions they might have inspired. All of the quotes are taken from the Augsburg Confession (Kolb/Wengert translation).

CONGREGATION COUNCIL



Our November meeting was held on November 12, 2024.

- HVAC Replacement/New Flat Roof We are waiting on HVAC equipment for construction to begin. Council will consider a possible preventive maintenance/replacement project of a section of roof at the time of rooftop HVAC work.
- Automatic Door Opener Council approved expenditure of \$6,500 in contract with Virginia Security Co. for an automatic/accessible front door opener and associated electrical work.
- Technology We are recruiting new volunteers to run equipment for live streaming of second service.
- 2025 Budget Council reviewed \$596,552 initial draft budget for 2025.
- Staff Bonuses Council approved staff bonuses, with payment to each staff member to include the appropriate amount to cover respective income tax. Council approved Parish Administrator's family healthcare coverage from 50/50 to 70/30 as part of St. Stephen's employment agreement with her.
- We welcome new members to the congregation on November 17.
- Several building security changes are underway or completed in advance of an insurance-required lock-down drill.

The next Council meeting is scheduled for December 10.

MUSIC NOTES

ADVENT LITURGY

On December 1, we begin a new church year. Our first church season is Advent, and our Advent journey begins with a change in mood and color from festival white to royal blue; from a rousing and victorious celebration of Christ the King on our last Sunday of Pentecost to a penitential preparation for the newborn King in Advent; and from using our Evangelical Lutheran Worship Liturgical Setting 1 to a musical liturgy taken from the Deutsche Messe-German Mass by the late Classical/early Romantic Period Viennese composer Franz Peter Schubert. Although he wrote in most genres, Schubert wrote more lieder (songs and song cycles) than anything else. Probably the one you know best is his "Ave Maria."

Written in 1827, near the end of Schubert's short life (he died at age 31), the *German Mass* is the most popular and enduring of the Austrian/German 'low masses', masses in which the congregation sang German hymns while the priest intoned the Latin mass. The singing of German hymns during the mass started in Austria in the twelfth century, and by 1260 there was a complete set of German hymns corresponding to the sung parts of the mass. The 'low mass' movement flourished during the reign of Kaiser Joseph II, who outlawed the performance of orchestral Latin masses. The Catholic Church did NOT approve of low masses (or of Kaiser Joseph II!).

Johann Phillipp Neumann, who wrote the texts of the nine movements of the *Deutsche Messe*, commissioned Schubert to write simple, homophonic music that would be easy for an entire congregation to sing. Just to be clear, homophonic music is when the melody aligns with the harmonies below it, a block-chordal style – think our traditional chorale hymnody. (Polyphony is the opposite of homophony – I think of polyphony as each part, soprano-alto-tenor-bass, doing their own thing and rarely "lining" up with the other parts.) The *Deutsche Messe* is an odd work as it was originally neither a mass setting nor strictly speaking, German. Instead, it is a song cycle of eight non-liturgical poems written and intended to be sung during a Mass either in its entirety or partially. Although intended for a Catholic service, the work was banned because it was an "unauthorized" German translation of the Mass.

In 1979, Richard Proulx* (1937-2010) adapted the mass for modern congregational use. The lengthy, flowery, romantic Neumann poems were replaced with the modern English church-approved words of the mass, and the movements were reduced to the Kyrie, Gloria, Sanctus, Lord's Prayer, and Agnus Dei. The Kyrie ("Lord Have Mercy"), Sanctus ("Holy, Holy, Holy"), and Agnus Dei ("Lamb of God") are included as additional service music in our Evangelical Lutheran Worship Hymnal, and <u>these</u> are the liturgical musical pieces we will use the four Sundays of this Advent season.

Judging by the large number of YouTube videos, the original form of the *Deutsche Mass* continues to be performed often.

STEPHEN MINISTRY AT ST. STEPHEN



Think About Becoming a Stephen Minister!

A few weeks ago, on All Saints Sunday, Pastor Jon announced that there will be classes for Stephen Ministers starting soon. You really should give some thought to taking the classes and joining our Stephen Ministry group at Saint Stephen! Stephen Ministers are lay Christian counselors who help individuals in the church who are going through personal a crisis such as death of a loved one or family member, medical crisis, divorce, financial set-back, depression or any number of other problems. Male Stephen Ministers attend to men and female Stephen Ministers attend to women. Stephen Ministers usually meet with their "care receivers" on a weekly basis for about an hour each week and ministries may last from a few months to a year or more.

The training in Williamsburg is conducted by our Stephen Ministry group and those from five other churches that take part in putting on an excellent course. This coming year, the course will be held at the Williamsburg Community Chapel. Most years, the course has been offered on Tuesday evenings with one Saturday session. This coming year, it appears that the sessions will be on Monday evenings with one Saturday session. The evening sessions last 21/2 hours. The schedule will run from the third week in January until mid-May 2025. Sessions are taught by the Stephen Leaders and some of the Stephen Ministers in Williamsburg. There are weekly reading assignments for those attending the course. You could expect lectures, discussions of the readings, Bible study, study of crises that we all may experience, and play-acting situations to get comfortable in difficult counseling situations. The course is outstanding and is helpful not only in Stephen Ministry but in all life situations. Many of us who have taken it have said that, in retrospect, we only wish we had done it earlier so that we had the perspective it provides earlier in our lives.

There is no charge for taking the course and books are provided. It is expected, however, that anyone participating in the course serve the church as a Stephen Minister for at least two years after their training (unless they move away in which case they could continue to serve at their new church if it is also a Stephen Ministry congregation).

Prayerfully consider signing up if you have the time and any desire to serve others in this way. Talk to any of our Stephen Ministers to gain perspective from them on their experiences. The ministries are totally confidential but the personal rewards they have experienced by serving are theirs to share. Feel free to call or e-mail me for more information or details.
