RESOLVE TO LOVE

January is a time of beginnings. It is also the time of year when people traditionally reflect on the past year and on their past in general. And out of those reflections often come New Year's resolutions. Where we try to begin new habits and live in new ways. Now, resolving to better ones' self is never a bad thing. But I have noticed that far too often such resolutions seem to be focused very inwardly. They are generally focused on things like your figure, health, diet, and/or habits.

But honestly, as Christians this inward focus is a bit problematic. Inward focus, even in attempting to better ourselves, is always dangerous. We can too easily become trapped in our inward focus. Too easily neglect others and God in our attempts to better ourselves. Such resolutions can blind us to where we need to be focused: on God and one another.

With that in mind, I now absolve you of your usual New Year's resolutions. Forgo worrying about dieting, or breaking bad habits, or anything of that sort and instead resolve to spend more time tending to your relationship with God. Resolve to try a new spiritual discipline (daily scripture reading, volunteering, praying the hours, meditation, tithing, writing, arts, etc.) that places your focus where it ought to be: on God. Resolve to listen more; listen more to one another, and listen more to God. And I assure you, with these resolutions in the front of your minds, those other more typical ones will take care of themselves. Physical well-being, emotional wellbeing, and spiritual well-being are all interlinked. Attending to God will help you attend to your health. Focusing on discipleship will bring about amazing things in your life and in the life of our community.

Write this down on a piece of paper and put it someplace where you will see it <u>frequently</u>: "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." John 13:34-35

These words of Jesus describe the essence of discipleship. This is how the world will know us as Christians: that we "have love for one another." This is how the world will know we are disciples. We love God by loving one another. We practice discipleship for God by serving one another. We take on spiritual disciplines to move our attention and focus outwards from ourselves towards God and one another.

The essence of sin is idolatry and that which we idolize the most, that which we love to worship the most, is ourselves. Jesus constantly called his disciples outwards from themselves towards God and one another. Jesus issues that same call to us.

So here is my challenge to you (though it is really Jesus' challenge to all of us): resolve this year to love one another just as God loves you. Just imagine the things that will happen in our homes, our churches, our community, if that is always in the fore-front of our hearts and minds! This is not an easy task, but it is certainly the most worthy one. It is **the** task that God calls us to and **the** means by which we are known as Christians. Have a blessed, love-filled, and loving New Year!

STEWARDSHIP ESSENTIALS

The January Stewardship focus will be seniors, and speakers from Williamsburg Faith in Action will be coming to talk to the congregation. Faith in Action is a nonprofit which provides transportation and other services for seniors, age 60 and up. Several members of St. Stephen's congregation are or have been drivers for Faith in Action. After completing training and background checks, volunteers sign up to transport seniors for trips to doctors' appointments, grocery runs, food pantry pick-ups, beauty shop visits and more. Interested volunteers may also provide home visits, well check calls, pick up and deliver groceries, or help with household or yard chores.

Each week, the Faith in Action office provides a list of needs and volunteers can sign up for one or more trips or visits. There is no minimum number of volunteer trips required of any volunteer. This service allows for seniors to remain in their homes, but still have access to transportation and other needs. In addition to providing a useful service, volunteers have the opportunity to meet many or our local seniors.

MUSIC NOTES

Our very first worship service of the new Gregorian Calendar year will be a celebration of the Epiphany of Our Lord. Just as Christmas is always December 25, the Festival of the Epiphany is always January 6, the 12th day of Christmas. Whereas other festivals have "moving" dates, these two feast days – Christmas and Epiphany are "set." Technically, this year we are celebrating a day early (January 5), but that is sort of how we celebrate Christmas, too, with Christmas Eve worship services.

The theme for our Epiphany service, <u>We Too Have a Star</u> to Guide Us, comes from the fifth stanza of the hymn "Bright and Glorious is the Sky:"

> Guided by the star, they found Him whose praise the ages sound. We too have a star to guide us, Which forever will provide us With the light to find our Lord.

Like those Wisemen, we too are drawn to the light of Christ. The service will begin with a procession, such as we can have in our worship space, that evokes the idea of the voyage that these Magi took to see the Messiah.

The hymn "Bright and Glorious" is a Danish one filled with images of light - bright, glorious, radiant, shining, a star as bright as day. Nikolai Grundtvig wrote this text at Christmastime in 1810. It was originally a 19-stanza poem for children. Grundtvig wrote about 1,500 hymns and was the most important Danish hymn writer of the 19th century. Another of his hymn's texts is ELW #298, "The Bells of Christmas." Jens Christian Aaberg translated Grundtvig's text. Aaberg pared the hymn down to seven stanzas with the first line "Splendid are the heavens high." The translation in our hymnal has six stanzas with the first line altered to "Bright and glorious is the sky." Born in Denmark, Aaberg came to Minneapolis in 1901 and subsequently was ordained in the Danish Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. Aaberg served parishes in Wisconsin, Illinois, and Minnesota and translated about 80 Danish hymns.

Depression at the New Year

Most of us look forward to the joy of the holidays. We love visits with the extended family members at Christmas. The gift exchanges and wonderful holiday meals are a great treat! Watching children and grandchildren frolic and play with newly opened gifts is a charm. Coming to Church and enjoying the Christmas festivities is a thrill. What's not to enjoy?

For some, however, the holidays can shepherd in a time of sadness. Some who have lost family members may be spending the joyous holidays alone, suggesting that wonderful times are in the past. It magnifies their feelings of loneliness. Others have seen their families dispersed geographically and unable to easily gather for the holidays. Still others may have seen their families become politically divided, estranged by issues such as differences in ideology or other issues where they don't see eye-to-eye and where family and social relationships have broken, seemingly irreparably. Divorce has split many families leading to depression and regret. Very commonly, chronic illness, dementia or other medical impairment has been the culprit leading to family breakdown, division, and loss of support and eventual depression. Depression is so common at this time of year that there are a couple of clinical terms for it: holiday blues or seasonal affective disorder.

As all of us watch out for our friends and acquaintances in the Church, just be aware that not everyone may be as upbeat after the holidays as you are because of the wonderful Christmas that you have enjoyed. We all need to take the time to listen to how all of those around us are doing. If you sense the someone is not doing well, take time to listen. Take time to sit down for coffee with them and get more of a sense of how deep their sadness is. Just seeing that you care and are showing an interest makes a **huge difference** in many cases. But please, follow-up with them soon or if at the beginning you sense very deep sadness or depression, please notify **Pastor Nelson** or **Bill Dichtel** with the Stephen Ministry Service so that we can mobilize additional resources. If desired by the individual, we can set up for a Stephen Minister to visit regularly. Stephen Ministers are individuals who have undergone extensive training and have significant experience in confidential listening and Christian counseling to help those going through crisis periods. We would be more than happy to help anyone experiencing such feelings.
