BONHOEFFER

A colleague and dear friend of mind recently reminded me of one of my favorite quotes from Dietrich Bonhoeffer's "Life Together." If you have not heard of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, he was a German Lutheran pastor and theologian who was imprisoned and eventually executed for taking part in a plot to assassinate Adolf Hitler. His life and legacy is a fascinating one!

In "Life Together," Bonhoeffer explores what authentic Christian community looks like. The quote I was reminded of is as follows: regarding the sin of a fellow Christian, "will not his sin be a constant occasion for me to give thanks that both of us may live in the forgiving love of God in Jesus Christ." Bonhoeffer continues saying "Thus the very hour of disillusionment with my brother becomes incomparably salutary, because it so thoroughly teaches me that neither of us can ever live by our own words and deeds, but only by that one Word and Deed which really binds us together the forgiveness of sins in Jesus Christ."

This quote from "Life Together" hit me in a powerful way. Take a moment and look at the world around you. We live in a world full of brokenness and sin. We are surrounded by headlines about the climate crisis and environmental damage, corruption and scandal in government, violence infecting politics, war in the Middle East, strife all over, hunger, poverty, and disease. And those are just recent headlines! We don't even have to go so far afield to see brokenness. Take a moment to reflect upon your life and actions. We can be acutely aware of our own sinful natures. When we are truly honest with ourselves we have to acknowledge our own selfishness, self-idolatry, and sin. We naturally look out for our own interests and make decisions that keep us safe, and don't really care for our neighbors beyond how they can benefit us.

As we look around at the brokenness that surrounds us...that is inside of us, it can be easy to give into despair and fear. It is at times like these that the road of faith can get pretty rocky. It is at times like these that Bonhoeffer's words offer us strength for that road of faith. The reason that quote hit me is because it offers us such a different way of looking at the world.

As we look at our imperfect, broken world we need to hear of God's grace more than ever! May the brokenness of the world draw us closer to God. May the sin manifest around us strengthen our faith in God's activity in our lives and claim upon us. May the words of Bonhoeffer, and the words of Romans 8:38-39 give us strength in our journey of faith and life together.

The June Council meeting was held on June 11, 2024.

- Approved a motion to recommend to the congregation spending up to \$550,000 under contract with Cox-Powell for HVAC replacement project.
- Proceeded with nominations for the June congregational meeting elections.
- Wrapped up contractor estimates for the installation of automatic accessible front doors.
- Our Reconciling in Christ (RIC) team has begun the process; some in the group have completed training from the national organization.
- With Pastor Alex Sheppard-Witt's departure, Pastor Jon invited John Wertz, Assistant to the Bishop, to meet with Council at the next meeting (date to be determined) and discuss/consider plan options for staff.
- Our new insurance company/policy provides needed, improved coverage, with an increase in cost.
- Scheduled several building maintenance items, including floor waxing, building power-washing, and dishwasher repairs.
- Our Music and Worship team has hung a new banner.
- Council expressed appreciation to Julie Meeks for completing her term leading and faithfully serving as Council president, and to departing Council members Corey Knestrick, Pam Buckley, and Susan Kauffman for their dedication and faithful service.

Also recognized was **Diana Tiller-Dichtel** for her service as Parish Nurse, and **Pete Davis**, who is stepping down as Treasurer – **Brian Agor** will be our new Treasurer. An upgrade of our aging HVAC system was approved, and you will find more details on page 3.

HEATING VENTILATION AND AIR CONDITIONING SYSTEM (HVAC)

Exciting News on Our HVAC System and Capital Campaign

The Congregation Council Meeting on June 16 yielded some significant news regarding our church's HVAC (Heating, Ventilation, Air Conditioning) system, plus a financing and capital campaign to fund the project. Maintaining a comfortable and welcoming environment in our church is essential for our worship services, community events, and daily operations. To this end, we have embarked on a major project to upgrade our HVAC system. To avoid disrupting the Preschool, and allow time for equipment to be ordered, the work will be done in the summer of 2025.

HVAC System Upgrade

We have partnered with Cox-Powell Corporation to replace our existing hydronic heating and cooling equipment with a state-of-the-art Variable Refrigerant Flow (VRF) system. This new system will significantly enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of our climate control, ensuring a comfortable environment throughout the church. Here are some key details of the project:

- Engineering and Design: Comprehensive engineering and drawings will be prepared for the entire building, excluding the Gathering Space.
- Equipment: We will be installing Daikin VRF equipment, including two air-cooled heat pumps, a Heat Recovery Unit, and an Outside Air Processing Unit.
- Installation: The project involves removing the old air-cooled chiller, seven hydronic air handling units, and the hot water boiler. New fan coil units will be installed in various locations, including the Fellowship Hall, Kitchen, Offices, and other key areas.
- Ductwork and Piping: New copper ACR piping and insulated ductwork will be installed,

connecting the new equipment to the existing ductwork.

- **Electrical Work**: New electrical circuits and disconnects will be installed to power the new equipment.
- **Control Systems**: A digital Daikin wall controller will be installed for each fan coil unit, along with a master I-Touch Manager Display for centralized control.

The total cost of this project is \$423,596, and it includes all necessary permits and inspections. The work will be carried out during normal working hours to minimize disruption.

Capital Campaign

To fund this critical upgrade, a financing and capital campaign was approved at the Congregation Meeting on June 16. Approximately half of the funds will come from existing church fund balances. The remaining funds will come from a **Three-Year Capital Campaign starting July 1, 2024 and ending June 30, 2027** (this gives donors four calendar years for contributions). Request for pledges will be sent out in July, 2024. <u>All contributions should be designated for "HVAC Project"</u> to be set aside in a separate church fund.

Your generous contributions will help us cover the costs of the new HVAC system and ensure that our church remains a comfortable and welcoming environment for worship and community activities.

Thank you for your continued generosity and commitment to St. Stephen Lutheran Church.

What About When It's Not Good?

I love Jesus, my husband, family and friends, dogs, horses, kayaking, sunshine, laughter, coffee, sweets, and more. I am grateful for this life, God's everlasting love and forgiveness, God's incredible, awe-inspiring creation, and so very, very much more.

"It's all good," as they say.

But what about when it's *not* good? When I'm really hurting? When there is estrangement in our family? Divorce? When I struggle in my faith? When I am heartbroken about a terminal diagnosis? When I just need someone to listen and pray for me?

These difficulties are all part of life, I know. Yet, that knowledge doesn't necessarily make them any easier. I was comforted when I learned that it's okay for a Stephen Minister to have a Stephen Minister!

We all have times in our lives in which we just need someone to listen without judgement, be present with us, and pray for us, while keeping our confidences. This need is perfectly normal, and aligns well with the offerings of Stephen Ministry. A Christ-centered and confidential listening presence is exactly what Stephen Ministry offers.

Our congregation has a team of Stephen Ministers standing ready to provide support; each individual Stephen Minister is a "care-giver" trained in Christcentered care. While a Stephen Minister walks beside you through your difficult time, it is our loving God who lifts you up, providing you with healing, hope, and strength.

If you are curious about or feel moved to request a Stephen Minister, speak confidentially with **Pastor Jon** or **Stephen Leader Bill Dichtel**. Then, if you would like to take the next step, you can be matched with a Stephen Minister and begin a one-to-one, confidential relationship.

The time commitment for meeting with your Stephen Minister is an hour each week. You meet at a location that makes sense for you and your Stephen Minister, whether that is in your home, at a café over coffee/tea, outdoors, or another place. This relationship may last a few months, closer to a year, and sometimes longer, coming to a close when mutually determined by you and your Stephen Minister.
