LANGUAGE

This article may sound familiar to many of you. It is largely based on the first reading for Pentecost (Acts 2:1-21). In that text we heard about the coming of the Holy Spirit and the resultant miracle of languages. The disciples were able to proclaim the gospel to the large crowds of people in Jerusalem, each in their own language. Doesn't that sound wonderful? I would love to be able to learn languages that completely and quickly!

Of course, that isn't how it works. Languages can be quite difficult to learn. Most of us have studied another language at some point in our lives; some have study more than one. But I would wager that the majority of us have lost any fluency we might have had in those languages. And why is this? One simple concept: use it or lose it! If we do not exercise our languages, we lose fluency rapidly.

This doesn't just go for the typical languages we think of like English, German, Spanish, etc. It goes for all the languages we learn. If we don't exercise the languages of our relationships, we will lose fluency in those. Think, for instance, of the special language that babies and toddlers often have. How are parents able to understand those unusual languages? They are practicing them regularly by being engaged with their children! Or the special languages we have within family units or groups of friends. If we fall out of touch with people, we lose the language we used to share with them, the common experiences and references that litter our speech can disappear.

Now we draw to my major point. The same concept (use it or lose it) also applies to the language of faith. Our

fluency in the language of our faith relationships is dependent upon our practicing that language. And we do this best in the arena of our faith relationships. But we in the church have done a terrible job of implementing this concept. We acknowledge the facts of this concept, but then, we don't do it! Instead, we relegate the language of faith, and its exercise, to an hour on Sunday mornings and a few minutes here and there throughout the week (mostly before meals and bedtime). No wonder the 20-35 age range is largely unchurched...they've hardly even heard the language of faith, much less have they learned it! With this in mind, I have some homework for you all. After this article you will find a "faith vocabulary" list. Please go through this list on your own or with others (at your own pace, maybe one or two words after your evening meal?) and talk/think/journal about what each word means to you. Share experiences of these concepts. Practice the language of faith!

HEATING VENTILATION AND AIR CONDITIONING SYSTEM (HVAC)



Our church HVAC has been described as "Byzantine." While not dating to the 5th century, it consists of three separate systems with some components going back to the 1960s. There is even a large

abandoned unit (do not open the utility closet off the Preschool Bear classroom).

As in olden days, the switch over from heat to air conditioning is a complicated, multi-step process only done twice a year. Some parts are failing, requiring frequent and costly repairs. For all these reasons and more, Congregation Council representatives have been meeting with multiple HVAC contractors to get options, plans and cost estimates.

With four contractor proposals, including one lowimpact proposal from our current maintenance contractor, the Council is prepared to present a concrete plan going forward. The work would occur when the Preschool is not in session in the summer of 2025. Details will be shared before the June Congregation Meeting for a vote and launch of a capital campaign.

STEWARDSHIP ESSENTIALS

You are the salt of the earth; but if salt has lost its taste, how can its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything, but is thrown out and trampled under foot. You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid. No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven. (Matthew 5:13-16)

Brothers and sisters in Christ,

In recent months I have shared some of my favorite Old Testament passages that help me think about how I live as a steward of God's blessings. This month I wish to shift to the New Testament, and I begin with the passage above – a portion of Jesus's Sermon on the Mount in Matthew's Gospel.

Jesus begins by telling his listeners (disciples and others) that they are the salt of the earth. So, what is it to be salt? In Jesus's time, salt was used not only to augment the flavor of food, but also to preserve food. So it seems to me that as followers of Jesus we are not only to add savor to the world around us, but we are also to be the means by which God preserves the world around us. Without God's life-giving activity in the world, the world (by this I mean human society) inevitably turns to selfdestructive ways. This is at the heart of Paul's distinction between living in the Spirit and living in the flesh. Without God's presence in our lives, we turn inward upon ourselves at the expense of others and our relationships with them. But thanks be to God, Jesus has called us out of our death-dealing patterns of living through the life-giving power of the Holy Spirit. As we seek to live out our calling as followers of Christ we cast the light of God's grace around us, enlivening our relationships with the light of God's love. When we live in the pattern established by Jesus, others may see the goodness of God and be drawn to the light of God's grace. It is as it was when God called Abram and said to him, I will bless you so that you will be a blessing to others.

The great blessing of stewardship is not that we are blessed (though that is most certainly true!), but that we become channels of God's blessings to others. That is God's will for our lives. And so we are stewards of the mysteries of God and instruments of God's grace for those around us. Thanks be to God!

AT ST. STEPHEN



Spring has sprung! The air is warm...The bees are buzzing and birds are chirping. The flowers are in full bloom and absolutely gorgeous. The air has wonderful fragrances. We live in a beautiful town that attracts visitors from far and wide. What's not to like about our surroundings?

Despite all of this, some of us will still feel down in the dumps. Sometimes the reasons are obvious and fully understandable to us. Sometimes these feelings just pervade and preoccupy us for no obvious reason. We can try to ignore them and hope they just go away. We can try to just shake them off. We can sometimes just go and have a beer with a friend and feel better about ourselves and life in general.

But when those simple steps don't work and the sadness, depression or disappointments persist, it may be time to get some help. It's true that some people can be so "down in the dumps" that a professional medical therapist or psychiatrist may be the best route to go and even prescribing of antidepressant medications may be needed. For the vast majority of us experiencing milder disappointments or depression, getting the help of a Stephen Minister to confidentially discuss your concerns and walk through your situations may be the best way to go.

Stephen Ministers are trained church members who are lay Christian counselors who can help those suffering through difficult life situations. Stephen Ministers meet with those that they are caring for on a weekly basis for as long as needed to help them get beyond whatever situation they are facing and having problems with. Their services are voluntary, free, and confidential. Confidential supervision is provided to the Stephen Minister to make sure that optimal care is provided. Such care could be invaluable for someone going through difficult times!

If you or someone you know or love is going through such difficulties and you feel they could benefit from having a Stephen Minister, please confidentially let either **Pastor Jon Nelson** or **Stephen Leader Bill Dichtel** know of the potential need for those services. We want to make sure that all of the needs of members of the Congregation are being served.
