A LUTHERAN PRIMER, 1

I have a confession to make, I love Lutheran theology. Some of the happiest times in my life have been with friends and professors, usually with a pitcher of beer, talking for hours about scripture, theology, religion, and the world. I know...I am a nerd; I've come to terms with that fact. But, since I love Lutheran theology so much, I thought it might be fun to cover some of the basics as either an introduction to the topic or a refresher, depending on where you are at.

Justification: God's act of making a sinner righteous. From a Lutheran perspective, this comes to us from God (and God alone) as pure gift. God accomplishes this through...

The Happy Exchange: This is a particularly Lutheran understanding that in the person of Jesus Christ (and possible through the communication of attributes) our sin and brokenness is assumed by Christ and Christ's righteousness is imputed to us.

Communication of attributes: This is an attempt to describe how the two natures of Christ (divine and human) exist together in the Incarnation. I say attempt, because we humans are too limited in understanding to express or comprehend how Christ was/is at the same time fully human and fully divine. This has been a bone of contention among theologians for many centuries. But it leads Lutherans to understand that in Holy Communion Jesus' body and blood are truly present "in, with, and under" the bread and wine.

Sacrament: Luther drew heavily upon early church fathers and Scripture to define sacraments with these criteria: 1) it has been instituted by God; 2) it combines God's Word with an earthly element; 3) it effects the forgiveness of sin through God's grace. These criteria led him to chop the list of sacraments down from Roman Catholicism's seven to, first three (Baptism, the Lord's Supper, Confession/Forgiveness), then just two (Baptism & the Lord's Supper).

Predestination: Luther largely encouraged avoidance of this topic, understanding that it was/is contentious and in the end, it is simply a mystery. Luther understood that God intends salvation for all. He believed that some are elect/predestined to salvation and that is a far as he would go (single predestination). He did not believe in double predestination (unlike Calvin, who did) which teaches that some are predestined to salvation, and some are predestined to damnation.

Justification by grace alone through faith alone: This is a key understanding in Lutheran theology; and the major cause of the Reformation. Luther taught that humans have no activity in our salvation. In other words, we can neither earn it nor will it. It is entirely God's action.

Okay, maybe this went deeper than just "the basics," but one summary seemed to lead to another; and we've barely scratched the surface at this point. I think I will leave things here for now (but please feel free to ask me any questions these summaries might inspire), and we will continue these summaries in my newsletter articles in the months ahead.



MUSIC NOTES

Musical Liturgies

This month's musical musings are some that you have heard before, but maybe need refreshing or I just like repeating myself. As we enter a new autumn season, we remain in the long church season of Pentecost. However, a new school year brings with it changes in scheduling: worship is back to two Sunday morning services, Faith Formation returns, choir rehearsals crank up, and we are using a new musical setting of our liturgy.

Have you ever attended a non-English speaking "liturgical" church and wondered whether you would actually get anything out of it? But then, the pattern, the rhythms, and the actions were familiar and comfortable. Those patterns and rhythms and actions are what we call liturgy. Many of you might have heard that liturgy is Greek for "work of the people." The Greek words, *laos*, means "people" and *ergos* means "work."

For me, liturgy is order. At my house, I like order – my cats do not (and I'm not so sure about my husband, either). Choir folk will tell you I like for them to turn their music in so I can file it right away. Handbell people will tell you I like for our tablecloths to be "unwrinkled," and I like for us to wear white tops and black bottoms when we play. I like our Sunday morning worship order – I like to have spoken word and musical responses intertwined.

When you look inside our Evangelical Lutheran Worship Book on pages 92-93 (this would be near the front of the book with the page numbers at the bottom), you will find a most excellent explanation of our Pattern of Worship that includes Gathering, Word, Meal, and Sending. This is the structure "that allows for freedom and flexibility in the ways worship may be shaped locally, while focusing on what the church holds in common." (ELW, page 91)

While each week our hymn selections change, many musical elements remain the same, notably the Kyrie (which is optional – we are currently not using a Kyrie), Canticle of Praise (which is optional – we are singing one now 'Glory to God'), Gospel Acclamation, Holy, holy, and Lamb of God. We refer to these musical elements in our "cranberry red" hardcover book or pew edition as musical settings for Holy Communion, of which we have 10. We also have two more Holy Communion Settings in the more recent *All Creation Sings* hymnal supplement. And,

we can also "create our own" musical setting with the many options offered in the "Service Music" section of our hymnal that are found in the hymnody #151-238 (this would be near the middle of the book with the Hymn numbers at the top).

This past summer, we experienced Setting Eight from the cranberry Evangelical Lutheran Worship Hymnal. (Those are still in our pews, even though we print most all our worship materials in the bulletin.) We did sing a Kyrie this summer, but not a Canticle of Praise. As we moved into the fall season, we have changed settings to Setting One from our ELW – this time we are not singing a Kyrie, but we are singing a Canticle of Praise. Perhaps comparing liturgy to grammar and language will help. The "grammar" (Kyrie, Canticle of Praise, Gospel Acclamation, Holy, holy, holy, Lamb of God) is the same; however, we are using a different "language" (musical style). The summer's Setting Eight might be described as more contemporary or "praise band" sounding, while Setting One might seem somewhat more traditional sounding.

There are actually three composers of Setting One, and all three of them are alive and continuing to enliven and enrich our Lutheran musical heritage. Mark Mummert, composer of the "Glory to God" we are currently using, is Cantor at Trinity Lutheran Church in Worcester, Massachusetts. The Gospel Acclamation (Alleluia) and "Holy, holy, holy" were composed by Thomas Pavlechko, Director of music and principal organist of Christ the King Catholic Church in Highland/University Park, Dallas, Texas. Robert Buckley Farlee composed our "Lamb of God." Recently retired, Farlee was Associate Pastor and Director of Music at Christ Lutheran Church in Minneapolis and served on the editorial staff at Augsburg Fortress.

In addition, the night before worship, you will receive an extra hour of sleep – Daylight Saving Time ends November 2.

Rehema has completed her Bachelor's degree coursework at St. Augustine University of Tanzania (SAUT) in Mwanza. She took her final exams in July, and she defended her research paper earlier this month. Her graduation ceremony will take place in November. She has maintained a high GPA throughout her degree program, and she has thoroughly enjoyed her time at SAUT.

Rehema's research project addressed implementation of dress codes at government versus private secondary schools. (Note: all schools in Tanzania require uniforms.) She interviewed staff and students at several different schools to learn how dress code impacts academic performance and overall student experience.

After graduation, Rehema will apply for employment with the Tanzanian government to teach Swahili and History in a government secondary school. However, she knows that government employment is not guaranteed, so she also plans to apply to private secondary schools (e.g., Lutheran, Roman Catholic). She is willing to work as a volunteer teacher if permanent employment is not immediately available.

Rehema has always dreamed of becoming a teacher, and it is exciting to see her dream come true. Her Bachelor's degree from St. Augustine will open doors for her and empower her to support herself and her family. Thank you for giving Rehema this precious opportunity. She and her family give thanks for St. Stephen every day!


